The VP Education and Students gave a presentation on how Education Council supports the Strategic Plan.

How does the Strategic Plan intersect with the role of Education Council? Education Council has two roles. One is an advisory role to the Board of Governors to advise on the implementation of new programs and courses leading to certificates, diplomas, or degrees, and the cancellation of programs or courses offered. The other role is the Powers of Education Council where the Council has the powers to set curriculum content for courses leading to certificates, diplomas, or degrees. There are two examples of when the roles of Education Council and the Standing Committees will intersect with the Strategic Plan; this is when reviewing new or revised courses or education policies and new programs. When reviewing changes, Education Council should not just be looking for content and accuracy but to also think about how they align with the Strategic Plan. They should be looking through the lens of the four strategic dimensions of the Strategic Plan – 1. Sustainability: Seven Generations and Beyond, 2. Focus: Transformative, Distinctive Education, 3. Deliver: A High-Performance, High-Support Organization, 4. Impact: Innovation for Thriving Communities.
